Series: He became like us

Luke 2:41-52 and Hebrews 5:7-10

### Introduction:

We are continuing our series of focusing on the humanity of Jesus. We fully embrace the deity of Jesus Christ, the Second Person of the Trinity, and we also acknowledge that he was fully human. Tonight we want to reflect some on how it is that Jesus, over the course of his 33 year lifetime, “grew” in wisdom and faith.

### Read and Discuss:

Read Luke 2:41-52 and Hebrews 5:7-10 aloud together.

1. Try to imagine how Jesus’ parents were feeling during the four days that they couldn’t find him (vv. 44-48). How might most parents feel? And how would Mary and Joseph also feel in light of knowing that Jesus was destined to have a special mission in life (see Lu. 2:16-19, 25-38, especially vv. 19 and 33)?
2. What is Jesus doing, thinking and feeling (vv. 46-49)? How do you picture Jesus’ tone in v. 48? Is he rebuking his parents? Doesn’t he realize they would rightfully be anxious concerning him?
3. Read v. 52 aloud. Do we see any “growing in wisdom” in this 12-year-old boy Jesus in this 4-day incident recorded in vv. 41-52? We know what it’s like for a

12-year-old to “grow in stature.” In what sense was Jesus the boy growing in wisdom, too, over time? How can God “grow” in wisdom?!

Read Hebrews 5:7-10 aloud together.

1. List everything you see here about Jesus’ humanity.
2. Notice the verbs-of-process: “LEARNED obedience from what he suffered”; “once made perfect”; “BECAME the source of eternal salvation.” What do these teach us about Jesus’ growth over time in his humanity?
3. If Jesus was fully God, how do we understand his “learning obedience through suffering”?

### **Application:**

1. Does it encourage you or make you a bit uneasy to consider Jesus as needing to “grow” in wisdom and faith over time?
2. In thinking of Jesus “growing” in his humanity, does it take away your appreciation of his divinity? Why or why not?

### **Prayer:**

*The Grace Downtown Prayer Team creates opportunities for our community to learn more about prayer together for our church family, our city, and our world. Throughout the coming week, the Prayer Team is asking our church community to...*
